# SHOWS

### **ROMEO & JULIET**

"Romeo & Juliet" is one of Shakespeare's most studied plays. Comedy and tragedy come together in violence and an impossible dilemma, and the audience witnesses an entire younger generation destroyed through misplaced aggression, obstinacy, and conviction. "Romeo and Juliet" is a combination of widely appealing dramatic elements: love, romance, sex, violence, domestic tragedy, fighting, comedy, and pathos.

## A Midsummer Night's Dream

There is no better play for introducing young readers to the dazzling brilliance of Shakespeare's artistry. The play is filled with whimsical and charming elements, such as fairies, magic, mischief, and a foolish artisan who wears a donkey's head for part of the play. It also has the added appeal of being among the most reader-friendly of Shakespeare's works in terms of the relative simplicity of its language. The jokes (and there are many) and key moments of plot are conveyed in accessible language, and they remain funny, even to modern audiences.

# WORKSHOPS

## **Intro To Shakespeare**

In Conversation

This workshop aims to provide students with the tools necessary to digest and understand Shakespeare's works. We cover the basics of scansion, translating Shakespeare for a modern audience, and why it still matters today.

Learning Style: Conversation / Lecture Activity: Text Analysis Material: Key Scenes Across Shakespeare's Canon

- Learning Outcome(s):
  - Students will recognize ways to understand Shakespearian language and it's relevance.
  - Students will be able to identify a part of the text that is exciting to them as the individual.
- To Achieve This, We Will:
  - Examine famous Shakespearean scenes and monologues in a conversational setting.

## **Shakespeare in Performance**

On Your Feet

Your students will work on their feet with our actors to learn the fundamentals of Shakespeare from an actors point of view. Students will learn how to use the language to make informed decisions about character in performance and examine the text of famous Shakespearean scenes to develop with their own interpretations.

Learning Style: Interactive Activity: Monologue Material: Romeo & Juliet / A Midsummer Night's Dream

- Learning Outcome(s)
  - Students will be able to walk away with a distinct understanding of the difference between Shakespeare in performance and Shakespeare as poetry.
  - Students will be able to create informed decision about the character and context.
- To Achieve This, We Will:
  - Spend time speaking and performing the text aloud with students.
  - Give historical context to Shakespeare's theatre (bear baiting, rough side of town, any first hand written documents of experience at original Globe).
  - Use Shakespeare's text to explain the idea of the "rock star" aspect to Shakespeare's characters (heavy use of the players in Hamlet).
  - Give students a clear and concise worksheet with a step by step process for putting Shakespeare into performance.

## **Stage Combat**

On Your Feet

This workshop focuses on the core mechanics of stage combat. Students will be taught how to safely and effectively perform a number of unarmed combat moves and be coached through a short choreographed fight. Remind students to dress ready to move- they will be breaking a sweat!

Learning Style: Interactive
Activity: Unarmed Stage Combat
Material: None

- Learning Outcome(s):
  - Students will be able to safely and effectively perform a stage punch, hair pull, and face slap.
- To Achieve This, We Will:
  - Give context to stage combat's usage and practicality (what makes it believable, explaining different fights depending on scenes/shows).
  - Provide step-by-step safety explanations and demonstrations.

# Comedy in the World of A Midsummer Night's Dream

In Conversation

In this workshop, our cast will perform select scenes from "A Midsummer Night's Dream" and guide students through finding comedy in Shakespeare's language. Designed to have an emphasis on examining textual clues that lead to the creation of character and comedic timing.

Learning Style: Conversation / Interactive Activity: Group Work Material: A Midsummer Night's Dream

#### • Learning Outcome(s):

- Students will be able to analyze the comedic scenarios, timing, and characters in A Midsummer Nights Dream.
- Students will recognize the fundamental clues to look for when digging for the comedy in a Shakespeare play.
- To Achieve This, We Will:
  - Discuss a broken-down definition of the different major aspects of comedy.
  - Perform brief snippets of Midsummer to show this comedy in action
  - Provide a handout on the basic rules of Shakespearean comedy.

### Violence in the World of Romeo & Juliet

In Conversation

In this workshop we will examine key points of violence within the world of "Romeo and Juliet." Using the text as our guide we will discuss what these moments teach us, how they aid the story, and how Shakespeare uses language to guide directors.

> Learning Style: Conversation / Interactive Activity: Examination of fights in R&J Material: Romeo & Juliet

- Learning Outcome(s):
  - Students will demonstrate a deeper knowledge of how violence is used in the story, what it meant to that society, and how Shakespeare uses his text to teach actors and directors how to perform the fights.
- To Achieve This, We Will:
  - Discuss the context, history, and language of these points of violence and how their effects are felt throughout the course of the show.
  - Examine three points of violence in the text of R&J (opening fight, Mercutio/Tybalt, Romeo/Tybalt).

### Class-Cut

*In Conversation* 

Class-Cut is designed to provide performance and conversational exposure within a class period. One or two key scenes will be presented from the selected show and combined with a Q&A/conversation on the classic scenes. Great for Shakespeare beginners!

> Learning style: Interactive / Observation Activity: Watch and Discuss Material: Romeo & Juliet or A Midsummer Night's Dream.

- Learning Outcomes(s):
  - Students will examine and analyze the plot of the given show.
  - Students will respond to Shakespeare in performance and express their thoughts.
- · To Achieve This, We Will:
  - Perform key scenes from your show of choice.
  - Lead a discussion on the characters and plot.
  - Open the floor for students to ask questions.
